

PEWS AND WOODEN CARVINGS

The choir stalls were designed by Sir George Gilbert Scott, made from Russian Oak from Ringa – two rows on each side, backed with guilded wrought iron. When the church was finished in 1872 there were no pews but temporary chairs donated by the Church Wardens. In 1884 the first pews went in with the parishioners donating money for their seats. They were designed by

I Oldrid Scott, Sir George's Son and made by Farmer & Brindley of Lambeth. The vicarage stall is partitioned into seven.

During World War II the roof was hit by a bomb. However firefighters controlled the blaze and the main body of the church was saved. The pews still show the scars from the falling burning roof.
